## BOOST' - FREE AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR 2ND - 5TH GRADE

Boost is busy bringing opportunities to students during out of school time. Each day Boost students have snack, recess, homework help, and an enrichment activity. The enrichment activities vary from art, to enjoying a teacher read aloud and computer time, to science experiments. UNL extension services, Why Try, and others partner with our program to present material and prepare activities for our students from time to time. Boost is a grant funded free program that depends on student participation and community partners. Our program receives funds based on attendance. In order for students to count towards our funding, they must attend 30 days throughout the school year. This is about 4 days a month or once a week. Students that enroll and attend less than 30 times actually count against us. So... if your student is enrolled in Boost please work hard to attend 30 or more days to help us meet our grant target. Reminder: No BOOST Oct. 7and 8 due to PTC'S.

## NOTES FROM THE NURSE'S OFFICE

What should I know for the 2015-2016 Influenza Season

It is hard to believe that it is October already! The beginning of October is the time to think about winter illnesses and how we can protect our children and ourselves from influenza and other illnesses. The influenza activity is extremely hard to predict and will vary season to season. Flu activity most commonly peaks in the United States between December and February; however seasonal flu activity can begin as early as October and run well into May.
The Center for Disease Control (CDC) recommends a yearly flu vaccine for everyone older than 6 months of age. This is the first and most important step in protecting our children and ourselves against this serious disease. Ideally you should begin getting vaccinated soon after the flu vaccines become available, ideally by October, to be certain that as many people as possible are protected before flu season begins. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against the flu. When healthy children are vaccinated, the antibodies should last the entire flu season.
In addition to getting vaccinated, you and your family can take everyday preventive actions, like staying away from people who are sick and washing your hands to reduce the spread of germs. If your child is sick with the flu, stay home from school to prevent spreading influenza to others. Also, a reminder that if your child has a fever, $\mathbf{1 0 0 . 4}$ or above, your child must be fever free (without fever reducing medications) for $\mathbf{2 4}$ hours before he or she can return to school.

If you have questions about the influenza vaccine or where you can obtain the vaccine, please give either Donelle Ellison or Patti Vincent (your school nurses) a call or check with your health care provider. You can also call the Home Care Plus Immunization clinic at 402-362-2566 for additional information and scheduling information. Most insurance companies will pay the nominal fee charged for the immunizations!! With all of us working together, we can keep the spread of winter illness to a minimum!

## Dear Parent/Guardian:

This month our school will be embarking on a special project, an all-school book club called One School, One Book ${ }^{\text {TM }}$. Every family will receive a copy of the same book - Beverly Cleary's The Mouse and the Motorcycle and will be asked to read it together at home over the next few weeks. I am personally asking you to make the time so that your family can participate in this special activity.

Reading aloud at home is valuable because it better prepares your child to be an effective reader, and it is also a fun, worthwhile family activity. With the One School, One Book ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ program, we aim to build a Community of Readers at our school. Everyone - students, parents, teachers, and even administrative staff - will all be following along together.

Your child will receive a copy of The Mouse and the Motorcycle at a special school-wide assembly introducing the program and the book. Along with the book, you will receive a reading schedule so that you can keep up at home. Generally, you will be asked to read about 15 minutes each night.

In school, your child will be invited to answer daily trivia questions to encourage and reward attentive listening. You will soon find that your child will take pride in knowing and anticipating the details of the story. In class, students will explore the book through activities and discussion. You will want to make sure your family keeps up so that your child can be included. Throughout the month, everyone will be talking about The Mouse and the Motorcycle!

One School, One Book ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ is a novel program in that children of all grade levels will all be listening to their parents read same book. Strange or daring as that may seem, it actually makes sound educational sense. Reading professionals recommend reading material out loud that is beyond a child's own reading level. We also believe that you can and should continue reading chapter books with your older children, even when they are able to read by themselves. We have selected a title that can be followed and understood and enjoyed by younger students, but will still captivate and stimulate older children.

I know that you'll enjoy this special reading time with your children. I hope to talk with both you and your student sometime this month about Ralph and Keith and the adventures that ensue around a tiny motorcycle. "When a whole school reads a book, there's a lot to talk about." With your help, we can build a Community of Readers at our school.

## Parents" Get Smart About Teen Prescription (Rx) Drug Abuse.

## Teen prescription drug abuse is when a young person takes a prescription medication that was prescribed for someone else, for a non-medical use.

## Facts

- ilin 4 teens has taken a prescription drug that was not prescribed for them by a doctor. ${ }^{1}$
- Every day, 2,500 teens take a prescription pain reliever for a non-medical use for the first time. ${ }^{2}$
- More teens abuse prescription medications than illegal drugs, except marijuana. ${ }^{3}$


## Serious Risks to Teens:

- Abusing prescription medications is not safer than taking illegal "street" drugs like cocaine or heroin.
- Teen prescription drug abuse can result in addliction, health issues, and can be fatal.
- Mixing prescription drugs with alcohol and illegal drugs is particullarly dangerous and can be fatal.
- Teen prescription drug abuse can impact a young person's develioping brain and good judgment, their relationships with family and friends, and academic performance.


## Your Home: <br> Safe Zone or Danger Zone?

Teens often get their hands on prescription drugs right in their own homes - from a parent or relative's medicine cabinet, drawer or kitchen cupboard.

- 64 percent of teens (age 12-17) that have abused prescription pain relievers say they got them from friends or relatives. ${ }^{4}$

## Medications Most Commonly Abused

Opioids - commonly known as prescription painkillers.

- Sedatives - such as anti-anxiety and sleep disorder medications.
Stimulants - such as medication to treat Attention Deficit-Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD).


## Take Action Now

## 1. Create a Safe Environment

- Know what's in your medicine cabinet
- Properly dispose of unused or expired medications
- Secure all prescription medications in a safe place
- Educate family and friends (especially grandparents)


## 2. Notice Common Signs of Abuse

- Physical and psychological changes
- Changes in academic performance
- Pills missing from the medicine cabinet

3. Talk to Your Teens

- Be open and non-judgmental
- Communicate regularly
- Talk about dangers of prescription drug abuse

Research shows that teens who learn about the risks of drugs from their parents are up to 50 percent less likely to try drugs. ${ }^{5}$
