### YORK DUKE PATH TO SUCCESS

Last month I focused on a new missing assignment process that YHS teachers and administration would implement during the  $4^{th}$  quarter. Once the quarter started, all teachers reviewed the new process with all students and we are seeing some successful results. Here are the steps when a student doesn't turn an assignment in:

- Step1 Teacher communicates with the student and creates a plan
- Step 2 Teacher communicates with student again, creates a plan and communicates with parents.
- Step 3 Teacher communicates with administration and student receives closed lunch, detention, etc.
- Step 4 Student attends closed lunch, detention, etc.
- Step 5 Student receives a zero for the assignment

Over the past two weeks we have seen a reduction of missing assignments. I believe this process has helped our students and teachers be more consistent about missing assignments. ### APRIL NURSE'S NOTES <u>SPRING HAS ARRIVED</u>

### Allergy Prevention Tips

Over 67 million Americans suffer from allergies every day. We don't want allergies to control your life. Severe allergy sufferers: get the up-to-the-minute local pollen count you need to help plan your daily activities...so you can take your allergy medication when it matters...before the allergies start. Check your local daily pollen counts. Just because you have allergies doesn't mean you should stop enjoying the outside world.

- Keep your windows closed in your home and car to avoid letting in pollen, especially when the local pollen count is high. Set your air conditioners to re-circulate in your home and vehicle, to avoid drawing in outside pollen-rich air.
- Sign up for allergy alerts so you can easily monitor the allergy counts in your area. Forewarned is forearmed.
- The pollen counts are the highest between 5am and 10am, so limiting your outside exposure during those times can be extremely helpful for diminishing your allergies.
- ♦ Limit exposure on mornings that are especially warm and dry; these will usually be the high pollen count days. Days that are dry and windy also have high pollen counts. The best time for outdoor activities is immediately following a heavy rainfall.
- Avoid line drying your clothes and bedding outdoors when your local pollen count is high.
- ♦ Wash your face and hands after you've been outside to remove pollen. Also, change and wash clothes if they've been exposed to pollen.
- Bathe and shampoo hair daily before going to bed to remove pollen from hair and skin in order to keep it off your bedding. Wash bedding in hot, soapy water once a week.
- Minimize contact with items that have come in contact with pollen, such as pets and people that have spent a large amount of time outdoors.
- Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes from pollen, and in severe allergy cases, wear a facemask when daily pollen counts are extremely high.
- Visit your allergist or doctor to see if the allergy shot is for you. Be consistent with your allergy medications for best results.
- ♦ If you're traveling, check our allergy forecasts for your destination. Also, be sure to check out our helpful traveling tips for allergy sufferers.

### Fight the Bite of Mosquitoes

- ♦ Avoid being outside during early morning or early evening.
- Wear long sleeves and pants when outdoors.
- Use an insect repellent containing DEET and is safe for children.
- Use screened windows and doors so insects don't enter your home.
- Screen or cover rain barrels.
- Empty all containers that collect standing water such as flowerpots, pet bowls, buckets, tires, toys, bird baths, tarps, etc.
- If you can, avoid wooded and bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.
- Walk in the center of paths.
- Wear a long-sleeved shirt, long pants and socks.
- Tuck the shirt into the pants, tuck pants into socks.
- Use an insect repellent that contains DEET.

### Symptoms of Diseases Spread by Mosquitoes

- ♦ Most people don't have any symptoms. But, the most common symptoms are like the flu:
- Fever, headache, and body aches
- ♦ Nausea, vomiting, and tiredness
- Some people may have a rash or swollen lymph glands

### Find and Remove Ticks

- ♦ Check yourself at least twice a day.
- Check under arms, in and around ears, inside the belly button, behind the knees, between the legs, around the walst, and in hair.
- Take a bath or shower as soon as you can after coming indoors (within two hours) to wash off and more easily find ticks that are crawling on you.
- ♦ To remove a tick, use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close as you can to the skin's surface.
- Pull slowly and steadily until the tick lets go. Do not twist or jerk the tick.
- ♦ Wash the bite and your hands with rubbing alcohol, or soap and water.
- Monitor the site that you pulled the tick from for any changes and report to the doctor if there is redness or swelling. Report to the doctor if you have fever, chills, headache or body aches.

### **HONORS NIGHT/SENIORS AND PARENTS:**

Honors Night will be held on Monday, April 18 at 7:00 p.m. If your student has received college scholarships and/or is planning to go into the **MILITARY (including National Guard)**, please let us know so we can include them in our program. Colleges and other organizations do <u>not</u> always let us know about these and we want to honor those students for their accomplishments.

### **AFTER HONORS NIGHT:**

After Honors Night, seniors will be sent important information on how to collect their scholarship funds. An e-mail will be sent to each student. (If a parent wishes to also receive this e-mail, please send an e-mail to Deb Stuhr at <a href="mailto:deb.stuhr@yorkdukes.org">deb.stuhr@yorkdukes.org</a> requesting this.) Most scholarships are paid per semester, so it's important to hold onto these contacts through second semester because you will be asked to submit your information to these committees again. If you do not receive the information a few weeks, please let the guidance office know.

Students are also required to promptly write a thank you note for each scholarship received. The notes are provided by the Guidance office, but postage must be handled by your student.

### REMINDER: SUMMER SCHOOL CLASSES FOR CREDIT RECOVERY

Summer school classes for credit recovery will be offered at the Enrichment Center again this year. This is only through the month of June for students who are at risk of not meeting York High School graduation requirements. Space is limited and priority will be given to first semester failures. There is a fee for attending summer school. A letter will be sent out to parents with at-risk students later in April explaining the process to follow if you want your child to take a class. If you have questions, please feel free to contact your child's counselor as soon as possible.

### 2016-2017 SENIORS

If you are considering college and plan to apply for scholarships, we encourage you take the June ACT test. Fee waivers for the June test are available until the regular registration deadline of May 6. ACT scores from tests taken in the junior year are used for Regents scholarship competition. Seniors have three chances (September, October and December) to better their scores for scholarships and college entrances (UNL, UNK and UNO require a score of 20). Many scholarships have very early deadlines (example: Horatio Alger – Oct. 31) so taking those earlier tests ensures scores will be available when needed.

### **REGISTRATION DEADLINE**

### **FEE WAIVERS:**

Cost should never be a deterrent when it comes to college opportunities. If this is an issue for your child, please take full advantage of fee waivers available through the ACT, SAT or the NAIA and NCAA. These are available for our students who qualify for free or reduced lunches. If you would like to know if you qualify or just want to pick up a waiver, you or your student needs to come to the guidance office.

### NAIA AND NCAA REGISTRATION

If you want to play sports in college, you will need to register with the NAIA (fee is charged) or the NCAA, depending on the college you wish to attend. These two organizations require ACT scores sent directly from the ACT testing center so you will need to include the NAIA code (9876) or the NCAA code (9999) in your choices of where you want your scores sent. If scores need to be sent later, there is a fee for each score sent. Please also be sure Mrs. Stuhr is aware of your college sport participation so your final transcript gets sent to these entities.

### SOPHOMORE AND JUNIOR PARENTS: CAREER ACADEMY AND SCHOLARSHIPS





### FAMILY TIP SHEET

### Sexual Imagery on the Internet

We want to help our kids develop healthy perspectives about sex, and not let the media be their only source of information. On the Internet, even innocent searches can lead to sexual imagery or pornographic content. So, it's important to talk early and often to make sure your kids get the messages you care most about communicating.

### • Figure out what you want your kid to know.

Identify your own personal concerns: What are you most worried about with respect to sexual imagery on the Internet? Why? How might the Internet interfere with your goals for your child's healthy sexual development? What alternative messages do you want to make sure they receive?

It may be awkward, but it's important to talk to your kid about:

- your key concerns regarding his or her exposure to age-inappropriate sexual images and messages
- why you have these concerns
- what you hope for your son or daughter with respect to intimate relationships, now and for the future

At the same time, you can encourage your kids to view media messages critically. Point out that sex often gets everyone's attention, so in the media sex is often used to sell something. It is important that your children understand that scripted sex is not reality. Pornography is extreme and not representative of the vast landscape of human sexuality; plus it can convey an exploitive and degrading perspective.

### • Pay attention to your tone.

It is important to remember that how you talk to your teen regarding this subject is just as important as what you discuss. Your tone and body language will communicate as much as your words! Think of two or three adjectives that describe how you hope you'll come across to your child when talking about sexuality. Then, keep those words in the front of your mind as you enter the conversation. Humiliating, shaming, or using scare tactics on your child regarding their sexual curiosity is both damaging and counterproductive. Your child's interest and exploration of sex and their own sexuality is both natural and normal. By making your son or daughter feel ashamed, you will lose the opportunity to help him or her navigate future challenges and develop his or her own values.



### • Take that first (difficult) step.

A great way to start the conversation is by simply asking your child if any of their friends have had conversations with their parents about pornography or sexual imagery on the Internet. You can say, "I know it can be awkward to talk about at first, but there are some really important things I want you to know." If you are nervous, write down what you want to say or practice when no one is around. Remember that no matter how the first conversation goes, this isn't meant to be a one-time discussion; you can (and should!) revisit or continue the conversation later if you forgot to include something or want to reemphasize a particular point. You've already fought half the battle just by taking on the conversation. Just by starting a conversation, you have communicated to your child that this is on your mind and that you're clued-in, aware, and concerned.

If you or your teen comes across any material that sexually exploits minors, you do have a duty to report it. You can report it to your local authorities or contact the CyberTipline for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. You can contact the center 24 hours a day at 1-800-THE-LOST or report an incident online at www.cybertipline.com.



If parents, employees and students do not feel that their complaints regarding Title IX, Title VI, Section 504 have met with resolution at the local level, they can appeal their grievances to the regional Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights.
